In 1893, the bottom dropped out of the silver market and the miners began an earnest search for gold.

And so, with the coming of the Little Jonnie, nature provided Leadville with another boom, and the gold production jumped to one and one-half million dollars, as a host of mines began production of the gold which was to make Leadville the richest camp the world has ever known.

In 1910, zinc carbonates were discovered in many of the Leadville mines, and during the era of the first World War Leadville again became a roaring city with production of zinc and lead ores from the Greenback to the Mikado, and the Wolfetone, the Penrose, and gold from Breece Hill and the Ibex.

After the war, the mines again were down. Through the depression years Leadville waited for another change in luck, and the change came with the great production of molybdenum at Climax, thirteen miles away, and with the coming of the Resurrection Mining Company, backed by Hecla, United States Smelting, and Morgan-backed Numont, Leadville again faces another era of prosperity.

No longer do the ore wagons raise the dust and carve ruts in Harrison Avenue. The smooth pavement replaces the muddy street, and many of the famous establishments along Chestnut and Harrison Avenue have disappeared. Automobiles have replaced the trotting horses.

Many mementos and relics of the past can be found in the Dexter Cabin and the Healy House, carefully preserved by the Leadville Historical Association.

Yes, it looks as though Leadville is opening up yet another era in its glamour-studded history. Climax Molybdenum is still going strong, with many new features being added with each coming year. The old Resurrection Mine, is once again heading for the forefront in production. Construction of new homes, together with increased public facilities, makes Leadville one of Colorado's more progressive communities.

Friendly and willing hands will greet you on July 30 and 31, when their one big celebration, the World's Championship Pack-Burro Race, will take place. Leadville welcomes each and every one of you to examine this historic old town, and reach your own conclusion that: "If you miss Historical Leadville, you've missed Colorado."

room for the night. The next day, Mrs. White used one of her hard-earned dollars to buy a ticket on the men's race. She guessed the winner's time would be three hours, 58 minutes, 10 seconds. Her guess, only 2.1 seconds off the actual time, rewarded her with another \$1000.

The race takes contestants through some of the most fabulously rich of Colorado's great bonanza gold fields. From Leadville, the trail leads up Fryer Hill and past the entrance to the Matchless Mine, where Baby Doe Tabor, widow of silver king H. A. W. Tabor, kept vigil in her lonely cabin for 35 years.

Near the famous Resurrection mine, the auto road dwindles into a rocky, climbing, twisting trail that's a lark for jeeps and four-wheel-drive trucks, but is murder for cars. This road was once the main route from South Park to Leadville. Although the racers are interested in something other than scenery, at the top of the pass a vast panorama of mountains unfolds in every direction — Mt. Elbert, the Mosquito, Sawatch, Collegiate and the Front Ranges.

But the real story, a story of stubborn courage that the pioneers themselves exemplified, is written every year on the barren, rocky trail over Mosquito Pass.

In 1954, a rambunctious burro named Kingo turned on his leader, John Stuart, and dragged him for a half mile over boulders during a warm-up run the day before the race. At noon the next day, Stuart, with bandages over his severe rock burns, was there at the starting line with Kingo.

In the race Stuart went through sheer torture. The burro fought him all the way; at times he literally was dragging the man. The winners in the race finished before five p.m., and there was no earthly reason for Stuart to finish, no reason except a man's refusal to quit.

But Stuart didn't quit. At 9:15 p.m., hours after the judges and officials had left their posts, Stuart staggered across the finish line, still pulling Kingo.

That's Colorado's World Championship Pack Burro Race — no place for a sissy.
